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INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

This 2021 Work Programme presents 6 focus Projects with their corresponding Objectives and Key Action Steps that the Minor Uses Coordination Facility (MUCF) intends to undertake in 2021 to meet the needs, recommendations, and requirements of our Member Countries (MCs). Part of the Key Action Steps is a continuation of Work Programmes that were initiated from 2015-2020. Objectives and Key Action Steps previously agreed in the Long-Term Work Strategy 2020-2025 are also included but are highlighted separately and identified as LTWS (Long-Term Work Strategy). The LTWS targets will be addressed in the future work of the MUCF. The key actions proposed for 2021 as well as the LTWS are subject to approval by the MUCF Steering Group Committee.

The MUCF works in cooperation with and for the MCs and stakeholders (producer organizations, industry associations, research institutes, regulators, government experts). The priorities identified in this Work Programme will continue to contribute to a sustainable European agriculture. In 2021, the MUCF will primarily focus on finalising the Guidance Document on Minor Uses (objective: GUIDANCE DOCUMENT), on serving as an exchange platform to identify solutions to plant protection issues for speciality crops under the Integrated Pest Management (IPM) framework (project: EUMUDA), and to coordinate, communicate and facilitate the work on minor uses between MCs (project: MEETINGS). The objectives are ranked according to priority in the individual projects.

on draft measures that the Commission intends to adopt.

PROJECT 1: MEETINGS 2021

Objective: Annual General Meeting

The 'Annual General Meeting' (AGM), involving all funding Member Countries, will meet at the end of March 2021. The AGM 2021 is planned as a virtual online meeting for the 23rd of March.

Objective: Spring Commodity Expert Group meetings and Horizontal Expert Group meeting

The CEGs and HEG will meet between the 15th and 30th of April to discuss ongoing projects. The timing of the autumn CEGs and HEG 2021 will be discussed during the individual meetings. CEGs work to close MUs gaps by finding chemical or non-chemical solutions within an IPM framework. The CEGs consists of national minor uses experts and representatives of the respective growers' associations or grower groups. The HEG discusses general issues related to MUs, as identified by the CEGs, the Steering Group or its members, aiming for harmonized procedures and at creating a level playing field among MCs.

Objective: Autumn Commodity Expert Group meetings and Horizontal Expert Group meeting

Planned as face-to-face meeting in Brussels, or as a hybrid meeting, meaning that if experts cannot participate physically, they get the possibility to join virtually. The CEG meetings are planned for 2 days (including plenary industry sessions) and HEG for 1 day on the proposed dates 2021-10-20/22. Participants will meet to discuss the progress of minor uses projects and issues.

PROJECT 2: EUMUDA-further development, updates, and maintenance

Objective: Survey on minor use needs, priorities, and solutions. The MUCF updated the table of minor uses needs in EUMUDA in 2018 and in 2019. In total, MU needs, priorities, and solutions from 31 MCs, are currently available. This survey will be repeated, and the table updated in 2021. The main goal is to keep EUMUDA dynamic, up to date and informative.

Objective: Comparison survey on emergency use authorisations (article 53). List of emergency use authorisations (granted 2017-2019) extracted from PPPAMS and compared to the table of MU needs and priorities in EUMUDA. Results of the comparison survey are publicly accessible in a new web page in EUMUDA (since 2020-12). This survey will be repeated in 2021 and results updated accordingly. Solving MU needs may lead to a decrease of emergency authorisations granted.

Objective: Discussion papers. The ideas of five discussion papers were developed during the workshop 'Minor Uses and Specialty Crops: The way forward in Europe' held in Paris in 2020 and are summarized in the MUCF roadmap for the future. They address, among other things, hurdles in minor uses work and aim to improve regulatory harmonisation.
